RESEARCH INTERESTS

Quantitative Interests: Contextual and Personality Variables Affecting Visual Information Processing, including psychological absorption, hypnotic susceptibility and imagery capacity. Visual information processing, attention and eye movements across stimulus levels of ambiguity, motion and concreteness, including studying eye movement responses during the Rorschach. ADHD and selective attention. I have begun discussion of and collaboration on projects with Harold Greene, Ph.D. Human subjects request has been submitted. I have begun a collaborative research effort with John Porcerelli, Ph.D. (Wayne State University Family Medicine Program) looking into various ways of assessing therapeutic change in psychoanalytic therapy cases, assessing quantitative and qualitative changes in single case (N=1) design. Interest in investigating various states of consciousness, including hypnotic susceptibility/hypnosis, day dreams/fantasies, dreaming, arousal.

Qualitative Interests: Psychoanalysis, myth and culture. The relationship between philosophy and psychoanalysis & psychology, such as philosophy of mind. The use of and underestimated importance of the case study for the development of knowledge about psychotherapy and psychoanalysis. Understanding the core concepts of psychoanalytic psychology as it pertains to science, healthcare and the humanities. Issues pertaining to the boundaries and regulation of psychoanalysis and professional psychology, especially regarding prescription privileges, evidence based treatment and mandatory continuing education laws.
